OUR PRESIDENT'S PARAGRAPH

It was a great pleasure for me to be able to attend the second Anniversary meeting at the "Royal " on January 27th and the dinner that followed at the Lord's Tavern. The hard work put into the arrangements for these functions by our Hon. Secretary and Treasurer - Philip Saunders - resulted in a most successful gathering, and I am sure everyone thoroughly enjoyed them selves. In a letter I received from our principal guest W. Ewart Gerrish, Esq., O.B.E. - he says: " It was just wonderful meeting such a friendly crowd." I mentioned at the dinner of the discovery of a very rare Jamaican item; and on my return home I found it awaiting me to examine. It was found by our member Harvey O'Connor of the U.S.A. and is a 1d. blue postcard addressed to Justin McCarthy, Kingston. The stamp is clearly postmarked with the "C" obliterator and Kingston circle cancellation dated 26/2/1884. It also bears Type 1 T.R.D. mark in black dated Laughlands 25/2/1884: On the reverse there is the stamp of Cranbrook, Laughlands P.O., and was sent by one L. Townsend. This is the first and only copy found with the "C" obliterator, and we now have proof it was used at Laughlands. It is also the first record of the Type 1 T.R.D. for Laughlands P.O. which, incidentally, was opened 1/11/1883. To me this is the most remarkable find in Jamaican postmarks in recent years. Another item I have recently seen, and which I believe to be unique, is a Type 16 T.R.D. mark for Myrtle Bank dated 9th May 1910. This Post Office was opened 16/1/1910 and originally had T.R.D. Type 10, so one can only presume it was closed and re-opened with the new Type 16. I look forward to meeting many of our members at the Brighton Congress being held from 5th to 8th June. On this occasion an Exhibition is being held to which specialist societies and study circles have been invited to contribute, and I understand some choice material will be on view in the frames that have been allocated to our Circle.

ANTIGUA

(Continued from page 6 Bulletin No. 8)

"After 1890 the stamps of the Leeward Islands replaced those of Antigua, but about 1903 a new design with the Arms of Antigua came into use. The values were from ½d to 2/6, and these were followed by a 5/- stamp of K.E. VII, all on Crown CC watermark paper. The colours were changed in 1908, and at the same time the new Crown CA watermark paper was used. In 1913 the 5/- value was changed from K.E. VII to K.G. V, and two years later the colours of the ½d and 1d were made more pronounced. During the period 1916-1918 a series of War stamps appeared, but without varieties. In 1921 a new and smaller design appeared with the head of K.G. V. The first values were 3d, 4d, 1/-, 2/-, 2/6, 5/- and £1. From 1922 the ½d and 1d (two colours and two shades of each), 1½d (three colour changes), 2d and 2½d (two colour changes), 3d, 6d, 1/-, 2/-, 2/6, 3/- and 4/- kept collectors busy. In 1932 the Tercentenary issue appeared in all values to 5/-, and 1935 saw the four values of the K.G. V Jubilee issue. The K.G. VI

Coronation issue of 1937 was followed in 1938 by a definitive issue in values up to 5/-. It was not until ten years later that the 10/- and £1 values appeared. The Victory and Royal Silver Wedding Commemorative issues appeared in 1946 and 1948 respectively, each with two values. In October, 1949, in keeping with other colonies, there were four values to celebrate the 75th year of the Universal Postal Union. In 1951 the University College of the West Indies caused two stamps to be produced with the new decimal currency. June, 1953, brought forth a handsome large stamp to celebrate the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II, which was in November of that year followed by the complete definitive set from 1 cent to \$4.80.

Other than the Capital ST. JOHN'S, the other Post Offices in Antigua have always been a bit of a problem. The Island is divided into six parishes: St. John, St. George, St. Peter, St. Philip, St. Paul and St. Mary. Four of these provided the name for that parish P.O., but three were later changed to a less Saintly name. "All Saints" is interesting as it is situated at the junction of three parishes.

I was informed that St. Paul's was closed in 1909, but I have a large red 1d of 1908-12 clearly dated 1961 which, I assume, is in reverse for 1916, but it could be that the "6" is upside down for "9" and that the "1"

should be "0" thus making it "09" which would be in keeping with my information of 1909. It would also be a more correct date of use for the large red 1d which would be exceptional to be used as late as 1916."

ANTIGUA

"With reference to Mr. Meredith's article in Bulletin No. 8, I can record another recognisable re-entry on the 6d green. It is in the letters 'NIUA' of 'ANTIGUA.' I sent this to Mr. J. E. Lea, who recently purchased the righthand half proof sheet of this value, and he kindly positioned it for me. It is No-58, and so it may be had se-tenant with the Sefi No. 1, which is No. 59. Mr. Lea states: "This is undoubtedly a re-entry. The markings in the 'NIUA' are constant and the usual criteria of re-entry show up more clearly on the under-inked half proof sheet that I have than on the stamp itself." I call this the 'McGowan' re-entry as it was so labelled in the lot that I found it in, so an expert had apparently spotted it."

JAMAICA

"As a keen collector of Jamaican postmarks I have been much interested in the articles by Mr. Harvey O'Connor in the last two issues of the Bulletin. There are certainly a variety of types in use of late fortunately supplanting the blotching Birmingham type, and in writing this letter my object is to try to arrive at a new and standard designation for these types. At present they are variously referred to as 'New Birmingham' 'single ring' or by arbitrary letters (e.g. N; Na and Nb), and I for one would like to see a type designation which is suggestive of each variety. First, there is the type with the office above and JAMAICA below enclosed within two concentric circles, date in two lines, with or without star above. I suggest that this be referred to as 'DC' (i.e. double circle), and in the case of a star being present, 'DCs.' Secondly, there is the similar type, but with the office and JAMAICA separated by a curved line, which is also portion of a concentric circle (i.e. there are three circles). For this I suggest 'TC' (triple circle) with 's' or not as required; although to date all seem to

have the star included. Then there is the single circle only. Call this `SC' (single circle) (e.g. ROBINS BAY SC and READING SCs.). The oval 'registered' type I also label plain `R' or `Ru' (unobliterated).

In addition to those noted by Mr. O'Connor, I have in his type `N' (my type `TC') FLINT RIVER and PLOWDEN, whereas my FAIRY RIVER has not the line replacing the slug and is therefore my type `DCs' My copy of REFUGE has the date correctly placed, as also have my copies of TOWER ISLE, TRANQUILLITY and WHITHORN in the R type. Incidentally, in my collection of New South Wales postmarks, I have found the misplacements and inversions so frequent and ephemeral that I have ceased to pay any attention to them, being due only to the human factor and carelessness; I have seen an 'error' appearing in the morning and corrected that same afternoon! I am informed that on 10th October, 1954, the following offices were issued with `single ring' marks:

Whether all these are all my TC or if some are DC I, myself, do not know. To date the only ones of which I possess copies are my type 'TCs' namely:- KINGSTON, OCHO RIOS and PARCELS POST."

JAMAICA

"The earliest type postmark consisted simply of the word JAMAICA in a straight line in large serif letters 35 mm. long by 6 mm. high. The earliest date of use known to me on a cover is in my collection dated 17/5/1762, which was originally in the late Mr. Nicholson's collection. The latest date known is 28/9/1781. A cover said to have this type postmark was in Harmer's sale of November 26th, 1945, and was stated to be dated 1758, and sold for £9. I cannot find out among my Jamaica friends anyone who saw or who can vouch for

this cover, which would be some four years earlier than any previously recorded. I wrote to Harmers' in 1952 and Mr. Cyril Harmer kindly informed me that the cover was purchased by a collector living at that time in Puerto Rico or the Philippines. Our Bulletin now enjoys a worldwide circulation, and I am writing this in the hope that a collector in Great Britain or abroad may be able to give me some information as to where the cover is and if it is dated 1758 as stated."

TURKS AND CAICOS ISLANDS

"I have a cover dated 16th August, 1947, postmarked Cockburn Harbour with 'C' and date in circle. Printed on the top of the envelope is 'On His Majesty's Service' and across the centre '1st Direct Airmail Service from the Turks Islands to Jamaica.' The stamp on it is K.G. VI 6d (S.G. 201a). I shall be obliged if any member can inform me how many of these covers were flown, as I understand this service is no longer in operation."
